16. Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

*Format:* This is an online course and you are expected to have access to the Internet and possess adequate computer competencies to email assignments as attachments and download and upload files. This course requires homework, discussions and quizzes on a weekly basis. The course is not designed as a self-paced course. No excuses because of other classes or commitments will be accepted for your failure to comply with these requirements.

Announcements will be posted on the site from time to time and you are **responsible for reading and adhering to all information in the announcements.**

The professor will initiate a discussion board and students are encouraged to exchange ideas through the discussion board. Remember, all work submitted must be your own. *Participation in the discussion board will be the basis for your class participation grade* and takes the place of live discussion in a classroom setting. **You are required to logon (and make a posting) a minimum of three days and have a minimum of four quality posts a week to earn full credit for class participation that week. Your first post is to be made no later than Wednesday of the week.** The purpose is to exchange ideas among students and the professor so feel free to respond to other students' remarks or ask the professor to jump in. All questions regarding the course, homework or reading assignments or other related course questions are to be posted on the discussion board so that all students have an opportunity to read them and comment. The course is not designed as a one-on-one course with the professor and, as in a classroom; sometimes many students have the same question. By posting a question to the discussion board you will help all of us get through the course easier. Please note that the discussion board is for discussion of the current chapter and you are expected to participate within the current week. Participation does not mean going back to prior discussions and posting comments, that is too late. Participation requires that you post something of value to the discussion and should be more than a mere "I agree" or "good answer". Note that there is no make-up of missed discussion board work.

*Assignments:* A schedule of reading assignments, Exercises and Group Exercises by week will be posted to the Assignment section of the course. Assigned chapters are to be read and assignments completed by midnight, Eastern Standard Time, Saturday utilizing an online homework program. The course is designed to run from Monday morning to midnight the following Saturday so that students will have the weekend to complete any assignments. **Late assignments will not be accepted.**

*Examinations:* There will be a midterm and final exam posted to the site. These exams are timed and you are expected to complete the exam in the allowable time. Once you begin the exam you will not be able to exit and re-enter the exam. The exam will be available for one week, if you fail to take the exam during exam week you will earn a zero for that exam.

Keep in mind that the syllabus—and total number of grade points—is subject to change and that it is the student's responsibility to note changes that are announced in class.
