Course Outcome Competencies:

Students shall:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the historical, religious, and social context of the New Testament world.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of some of the critical methods used in New Testament studies.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of the basic content of the New Testament and its main teachings (theological content).
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the canonical process producing a more complete understanding of the New Testament.

Attendance Requirements—External Campuses

Students enrolled at one of the university's external campuses should make every effort to attend all class meetings. All absences must be explained to the instructor, who will then determine whether the omitted work may be made up. When a student reaches that number of absences considered by the instructor to be excessive, the instructor will so advise the student and file an unsatisfactory progress report with the external campus executive director/dean. Students who miss the first class meeting without providing a written explanation to the instructor will be automatically dropped from the roster as a “no-show.” Students who know in advance that they will be absent from the first class meeting and who wish to remain in the class must inform the instructor in order to discuss possible arrangements for making up absences.

Professor’s Additional Attendance Requirements: You are expected to attend every class. In the event of an emergency, make every effort to contact the professor prior to the absence. Any missed work, including group discussion must be made up outside of class time. *In no case will any student who has missed more than 25% of class attendance (i.e., three sessions) be able to pass the course.*

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

Attendance/Discussion Board: To ensure your understanding of the material, there will be BlackBoard Discussion topics presented most weeks. The discussion board questions must be answered by the start of class the next week to receive credit.

Exams: There will be a total of two exams. Each exam will be a combination of multiple choice, short-answer and essay questions. The exams will cover only the information covered since the last exam. Exams will be given during the first hour of the class period. *If a student is absent for an exam, the exam must be completed/proctored prior to returning to class.*

**A grade of incomplete is changed if the work required is completed prior to the last day of the next long (10-15 weeks) term, unless the instructor designates an earlier date for completion. If the work is not completed by the appropriate date, the "I" is converted to a grade of "F". An incomplete notation cannot remain on the student's permanent record and must be replaced by the qualitative grade (A-F) by the date specified in the official University calendar of the next regular term. An incomplete grade will be indicated by the notation I/grade on the student transcript. A grade of "CR" indicates that credit in semester hours was granted but no grade or grade points were recorded.

- **Procedure for computations of final grade**

Students shall have protection through orderly procedures against prejudices or capricious academic evaluation.
