Course Outcome Competencies:

Students shall:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the historical, religious, and social context of the Old Testament world.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of some of the critical methods used in Old Testament studies.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of the basic content of the Old Testament and its main teachings (theological content).
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the canonical process producing a more complete understanding of the Old Testament.

Attendance Requirements—External Campuses

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

Attendance/Discussion Board: To ensure your understanding of the material, there will be BlackBoard Discussion topics presented each week. The discussion board questions must be answered by the start of class the next week to receive credit.

Exams: There will be a total of two exams. Each exam will be a combination of multiple choice, short-answer and essay questions. The exams will cover only the information covered since the last exam, with the exception of the final exam, which will contain at least one question from the previous two exams. Exams will be during the first hour of the class period. *If a student is absent for an exam, that exam must be completed/proctored before returning to class.*
